Dear Newburyport Resident,

The Newburyport Department of Public Health (DPH) has designed this guide to provide you with important information from the city on health and environmental services pertaining to solid waste, recycling, environmental safety, and public health. Please refer to this guide and the city's website www.cityofnewburyport.com under the Health Department for specific information, collection dates and fees.

The mission of the DPH is to provide enforcement of public health laws, environmental protection laws, and public health rules and regulations. The department investigates communicable disease in the community and takes proactive actions to ensure optimum public health protection of the citizens of Newburyport so they may enjoy their environment and live free of disease and other adverse environmental factors.

In addition to enforcement, our focus is on providing residents with quality services that are convenient for residents and cost effective for the city. Since beginning our single stream recycling (all curbside recycling material in one container) the city has reduced our solid waste (trash) while increasing our recyclables. This is good news as we now pay less for our solid waste disposal while having increased our recycling rebate. Thank you to all of the residents who have worked to make this possible.

Every household received one 64-gallon recycling cart. These carts belong to the house and should be left at the house in the event of a move.

Please remember to place them at the curb as directed on the lid and three feet from any standing object.

Recycling and Solid Waste Collection

Solid waste is collected Monday through Friday. During the designated holidays, collection will be delayed one day for the remainder of the week. The holidays are Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Memorial Day (2012). Christmas and New Year's Day will be recognized on the Monday after the holiday therefore collection will be delayed one day on those weeks. Recyclables are picked up every other week and will also be delayed by one day on the same holidays. All residents are required to separate recyclable material from trash according to the City's Health and Sanitation Ordinance, Chapter 8, Article III, Division 1; It is mandatory to recycle cardboard, paper, glass, metal and plastic containers. (*Sec. 8-93 Enforcement & Penalties. Failure to comply with recycling ordinance: \$100 fine.*)

Trash with visible recyclable material will be stickered and will not be picked up.

SOLID WASTE ORDINANCE

(Chapter 8, Article III, Division I, Generally, & 8-83, Regulations)

- (a) No disposable refuse shall be exhibited for collection prior to 5:00 p.m. on the day before the day of collection.
- (b) Disposable refuse shall be placed in closed containers or durable heavy duty bags, securely tied. All loose material, such as cardboard, packing material, etc., shall be broken down and securely tied, if needed.
- (c) Commercial refuse containers shall be removed from sidewalks within one (1) hour after collection. Residential containers shall be removed from the street by 6:00 p.m. on the day of collection.
- (d) It shall be unlawful for any owner, manager or employee of a commercial establishment or institution or resident of the boundary area described in Section 8-81 to deposit solid waste from that commercial establishment, institution or residence in any receptacle maintained by the city for the disposal of litter by pedestrians.
- (e) All commercial, institutional and residential customers will place disposable refuse in such a manner as not to interfere with motorist or pedestrian travel.
- (f) Enforcement of these provisions shall be by the police department, board of health, and the department of public works or be punishable by a fine of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00).
- (g) No dumpsters shall be picked up and/or emptied in residential areas between the hours of 10:00p.m. and 7:00a.m. Penalty for violation of this subsection shall be a written warning for the first offense, followed by a three-hundred-dollar fine (\$300.00) for each subsequent offense issued to the operator of the vehicle. Enforcement of this provision shall be by the police department.
- (h) Said disposable refuse shall be the property of the owner, representative of the owner, occupant or operator.

CURBSIDE RECYCLING & SOLID WASTE REMINDERS

Recycling is mandatory and will be enforced. Recycling is single stream; simply place all recyclables in one container. Set recycling bins and trash out by **7:00 am** on collection day.

GENERAL REMINDERS:

- **Bulky items** like furniture, mattresses, and carpet (cut in 4-ft. sections) must have a bulk sticker attached. Bulk stickers can be purchased at Health Department in City Hall for \$5 per item, one item per week. No white goods or metal items allowed.
- Large **cardboard** can be recycled. It must be bundled, tied and left next to your container. Waxed cardboard is okay to recycle.
- **Construction material** (including toilets and sinks) is not allowed in the trash and must be taken to a disposal site.
- **Containers** must be rinsed.
- Electronics, batteries, cell phones, oil, oil paint, textiles, white goods (i.e. large appliances) must be brought to the Recycling Center. See page 4.
- **Glass bottles / Jars** must be green, clear, or brown. No broken or other glass such as light bulbs, window or auto glass, dishes, glasses or pyrex.
- Latex paint can be dried and thrown out in your trash **without a lid**; use kitty litter for fast drying.
- **Plastic bags** should be brought to the grocery store.
- **Plastic containers** labeled 1 through 7 are allowed. No plastic bags - No styrofoam.
- **Recycle all your paper!** "If it rips, recycle it."
- **Styrofoam**--peanuts to Pak Mail, formed styrofoam should be thrown in the trash.
- **Tin, steel and aluminum:** Food cans and lids, deposit and non-deposit beverage cans (may be flattened). No cans containing hazardous material, paint or aerosol.
- **Trash** is limited to 5 bags or 3 (35 gal) barrels per household each week. Barrels 64 gallons and larger will not be picked up.
- **Wood.** No large wood items will be accepted at the curb.

CURBSIDE BAGGED LEAF COLLECTION

Collections will take place on your regular trash day the following weeks

Nov. 28, Dec. 5, Dec. 12, (2011) April 23, May 7 (2012)

Place leaves in brown leaf bags or loose in a marked barrel. Bags must be at the curb by 6 a.m. and contain only leaves. Please do not overfill bags. Trash pick up may be delayed by up to two hours on leaf days.

CHRISTMAS TREE COLLECTION

Collections on regular trash day during the entire month of January. Trees must be out by 7 am on your normal trash day.

- NO wood, plastic bags, or plastic containers allowed.
- Grass clippings are recommended to stay on lawns and discouraged at the compost facility.
- Please keep brush and leaves separated.

Burning

The season for open burning is from January 15 to May 1 from 10 am to 4 pm. Property owners must obtain a valid permit from the fire department (**978-465-4427**) before conducting any open burning. Permits allow the burning of brush, cane, driftwood, and forest debris but prohibit the burning of grass, hay, leaves and tires.

Burning must be conducted on land near the location of the materials to be burned, and at least 75 feet from a dwelling. Those conducting open burns are encouraged to keep fire suppression tools handy and monitor the burn closely until it is dead out. For more information on open burning regulations and permitting, go to www.mass.gov/dcr and click on conservation then forest fire control.

Environmental Safety

In an emergency, such as a chemical spill, immediately contact your local fire department and call Massachusetts Department of Protection (DEP) 24-hour emergency response section at **1-888-304-1133**. In addition, if you see or suspect illegal activity such as sewer or illegal dumping of hazardous material that is placing people's health or natural resources at risk, call interagency Environmental Strike Force at **888-846-5283**. To report an environmental health issue, first contact the Newburyport Health Office at **978-465-4410** or the Massachusetts Department of Public Health at **617-727-2700**. For coastal environmental emergencies, contact Coastal Zone Management at **617-727-9530** or the Department of Environmental Management at **617-727-3159**.

Additional Hard to Dispose of Items and Where to Bring Them

- **Appliances** - Bring to Nichol's Scrap Metal, 978-388-9639. Or to Crow Lane Recycling Center.
- **Air conditioners, refrigerators, and dehumidifiers** contain Freon. For pick-up call refrigeration company like Foucault Appliance for removal 978-372-6117 or bring to Crow Lane Recycling Center. Fees apply.
- **Asphalt, brick, concrete, or clean fill** - Miles River, 978-356-2290
- **Books** - Donate to Newburyport Public Library for book sales , call 978-465-4428 for details. Or take to used book store like Middle Street books or Jabberwocky for credit. If not able to donate or resell take to Got Books container on Kent Street.
- **Cardboard** - Large amounts only. Bring to Crow Lane Recycling Center.
- **Carpets and rugs** - Put out on trash day with bulk sticker that can be purchased for \$5 each at City Hall in Health Department. Please cut and tie into 4-foot sections. Only one item per month.
- **Cell phones and ink jet cartridges** – Bring to Health Department in City Hall or to Crow Lane Recycling Center.
- **Confidential Material** – Save for next shredding day at the Crow Lane, Saturday, May 5, 2012
- **Construction material** - Call disposal company like Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581.
- **Fluorescent light bulbs** –Bring to Crow Lane Recycling Center, \$.07/foot
- **Furniture (non-metal)** - Put out on trash day with bulk sticker that can be purchased at City Hall in the Health Department. Considered one large item. No large wood objects.
- **Gas grills** - Remove propane tank and briquettes or rocks bring to Nichol's Scrap Metal in Amesbury. 978-388-9639 or bring to Recycling Center first Saturday of every month.
- **Gasoline** – Bring to HHW Day, September 10, 2011. Fees apply.
- **Gutters** - Aluminum gutters may be brought to Nichol's Scrap Metal in Amesbury 978-388-9639 or brought to Crow Lane Recycling Center. Wood gutters may be brought to disposal company like G. Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581.
- **Helium Tanks** - \$1 each, Crow Lane Recycling Center.
- **Latex paints** - Remove lids, dry out paint, and throw in trash. Use kitty litter for fast drying.
- **Lumber** - Call disposal company like Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581.
- **Mattress and boxspring** - Put out on trash day with **bulk sticker**. Purchase at City Hall in Health Department. One item per week.
- **Mercury thermometers**– Bring to Newburyport Health Department in City Hall. Trade it in for a digital one.
- **Metal Goods** – Appliances, bikes, water heaters, etc. Nichol's Scrap Metal, 978-388-9639 or bring them to Crow Lane Recycling Center.
- **Microwaves** - Bring to Crow Lane Recycling Center. Fee applies.
- **Needles/Sharps** - Needles, syringes and sharps containers may not be thrown in recycling bins. Needles, syringes and lancets must be placed in a rigid, puncture resistant, sealed, leak-proof container and may be put in the trash.
- **Oil paint** - Bring to Household Hazardous Waste Day, September 10, 2011, 7:30-11:30 am, DPW. \$3/gallon
- **Prescription Drugs and Medication Drop Off**– Bring any unused or old prescription medication to the front lobby container at the Newburyport Police Station on Green Street, 7 days per week, 24 hours per day. *See also back page for more details.*
- **Propane tanks** – Bring to Crow Lane Recycling Center. Fees apply.
- **Recyclables** - Large quantities of recyclable containers and newspapers may be brought to G. Mello Disposal in Georgetown, 978-352-8581.
- **Solvents, chemicals, pesticides, etc** - Bring to next Household Hazardous Waste Day, September 10, 2011, 7:30-11:30 am, DPW. \$3 per gallon. For other town HHW events – call 978-499-0413
- **Styrofoam peanuts** - Bring to Pak Mail, 25 Storey Ave, Nbpt. Must be clean and bagged.
- **Textiles** - Old clothing, shoes, blankets, stuffed animal etc. leave in white recycling bins at Nock Middle School or Compost Facility.
- **Tires** – Bring to Crow Lane Recycling Center. \$3 fee per tire
- **Used motor oil** - Bring to Crow Lane Recycling Center, no fee.
- **Windows** - Disposal company like Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581.
- **Wooden items** - Large wooden items will not be accepted at the curb. Please call a disposal company like Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581.

Directions to Crow Lane

Travel west on Low Street and proceed past Nock Middle School. Crow Lane is one mile on the left after the school at the North Atkinson Street intersection.

Directions to Nichol's Scrap Metal, 978-388-9639

Rt. 110 to Elm Street, Elm Street is the right at the intersection where Friendly's and Burger King are. Travel along Elm Street and go down the hill into the downtown area. Railroad Avenue is a left immediately before the gas station that is on your right.

Directions to Mello Disposal Transfer Station, 978-352-8581

Rt. 95 South to Rt. 133 Georgetown exit. Go right off exit into Georgetown. Drive approximately 1 mile to the left that is labeled Georgetown DPW and Mello Disposal Transfer Station

Public Health Nurse

The Public Health Nurse provides clinical evaluation, case management, epidemiology and health education, and skills essential in helping to protect the health of the City of Newburyport

The Public Health Nurse's responsibilities are based on laws, regulations, and good practice. These include but are not limited to:

- Communicable disease investigation
- Oversee the Tuberculosis Program.
- Organize and conduct immunization clinics for influenza
- Provide education, consultation, and referrals for individuals, health care providers and other agencies.

Disease Investigation and Surveillance

Required by the 105 CMR 300.000, the Health Department follows, investigates, and follows up on a list of infectious diseases that may endanger the public. Collaborating with the Massachusetts Department of Public Health and health providers, the Public Health Nurse assists with enforcement of State isolation and quarantine regulations.

What We Are Doing

As a result of the events of September 11, 2001, subsequent terrorist events, and natural disasters, the Newburyport Health Department has participated in federal, state, and local educational, planning, and needs-assessment sessions aimed at establishing an integrated national, state, and local emergency response network.

Other City Departments

Our colleagues in the Emergency Management, Fire and Police Departments are also positioned to receive appropriate training for emergency response. It has been established as a national goal to have the health and first responder community work seamlessly with the Mas-

sachusetts Emergency Management Agency (MEMA) and the medical community to provide a comprehensive emergency response and management system in order to successfully respond to natural and man-made disasters.

Other Public Health Communities

The Newburyport Health Department is currently working with 14 other contiguous communities to implement the preparedness requirements enumerated in the grant from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC).

Animal Control

The Animal Control Officer (ACO) is responsible for ensuring compliance and enforcement of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts State Sanitary Code 330 CMR 10.00 "Prevention of the Spread of Rabies", The Massachusetts Department of Agricultural Resources- Animal Health, Commonwealth of Massachusetts General Law Chapter 129 and the City of Newburyport leash law and proper disposal of animal waste. The ACO is a duly licensed Officer in accordance with Massachusetts General Laws.

The ACO is also an Animal Inspector responsible for investigating animal bites and working with local veterinarians to determine an appropriate quarantine procedure to monitor or rule out any possible exposures to the rabies virus. Every year, the Health Department sponsors a rabies clinic for cats and dogs.

Disposal of Animal Waste. Section 3-2

All persons owning or in custody of an animal will be responsible for the removal and disposal of that animal's waste. The fine for violation of this provision for the first offense shall be fifty dollars (\$50.00) and the second shall be seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) and third and subsequent offenses shall be one hundred dollars (\$100.00).

Leash Law. Section 3-26

No person shall own or keep in the city, outside the confines of the owner's or keeper's property, any dog which is not held firmly on a leash. Failure to comply with subsection (a) shall be punishable by the following schedule of fines:

First offense \$ 25.00 Second offense \$50.00 Third offense \$75.00

Pilot Program: Clipper Canine Off Leash Dog Shared Use Areas

Amendment to Leash Law. Section 3-26 (effective April 29, 2011)

Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), for the seven (7) months following the effective date of this subsection, dogs are allowed off leash at Cashman Park, Moseley Woods, and March's Hill, subject to the exclusions and restrictions, off leash hours, and seasonal restrictions set forth in the following Table of Designated Off Leash Areas and subject to the Rules set forth in subsection (e), respectively, below:

Cashman Park

Excluding: playground, basketball court, tennis court, baseball field & soccer field and walkways

7:30 a.m. – 9:00 a.m. 4:00 p.m. - 7:00 p.m. Year round

Moseley Woods

Excluding: playground, pavilion & picnic areas

7:30 a.m. - 10:30 a.m. 4:00 p.m. - 7:00 p.m. Year round

March's Hill

Excluding: basketball court

7:30 a.m. - 10:30 a.m. 4:00 p.m. - 7:00 p.m. No off leash dogs allowed at times when children are sledding

(e) The following Rules apply to the use of Designated Off Leash Areas:

Owners, per the below Rules, define persons with direct care, custody, and control of a dog while in a designated off leash area.

- (1) Dogs must be licensed and vaccinated as required by applicable law and ordinance (this is the case for both leashed and off leash dogs) and have no contagious conditions, diseases or parasites.
- (2) Dogs must be leashed when entering and when exiting a designated off leash area.
- (3) Dogs with a history of dangerous or aggressive behavior, e.g. history of dog fights or aggression toward people as determined by the Animal Control Officer, are prohibited from designated off leash areas during designated off leash times.
- (4) Dogs younger than four months of age are not allowed off leash as all inoculations are incomplete at this age.
- (5) Intact unleashed male dogs must be supervised closely and immediately removed or leashed if interfering with other dogs.
- (6) Female dogs in season/heat are not allowed off leash in designated off leash areas.
- (7) Owners must immediately remove from designated off leash areas dogs who are exhibiting aggressive behavior towards people, other dogs or wildlife.
- (8) While in designated off leash areas, owners must remain with and monitor their dogs.
- (9) Owners must carry a leash, one leash per dog is required.
- (10) Owners must have in their possession an adequate number of bags, or other appropriate device, e.g. a pooper scooper, in their possession for removal of their dogs' waste.
- (11) Owners must clean up after their dogs, owners who fail to do so are subject to a fine in accordance with applicable law and ordinances. This is the case for both leashed and off leash dogs.
- (12) No digging is allowed. Owners must fill in any holes dug by their dogs.
- (13) No owner shall have more than two unleashed dogs in a designated off leash area at any one time.
- (14) Off leash dogs are not allowed in playgrounds, tennis courts, basketball courts and athletic fields.
- (15) Owners in violation of above Rules shall be subject to a fine of fifty dollars (\$50.00).
